### Helpful Hint: (from the Stark Family kitchen)

Now that the Surinam cherries are ripening, it is time to prepare some tasty desserts, preserves, and wine from this versatile fruit. But pitting them is really the pits! And of course, they are not all ripe at once. Collect the fruits as they ripen. Do not rinse, unless there is an obvious dirt problem, and if you do rinse, be sure the fruit is dry before continuing. Place the fruit in plastic freezer bags, up to a quart per bag. Close with a twist tie and freeze. If the bag is not full, more fruit can be added as it is picked. When you have sufficient frozen fruit for your recipe, take one bag out of the freezer. Dump the fruit into a colander and rinse briefly with cold tap water. Do not thaw. Use you fingers to "pop" the pit from each cherry, placing the cherries in a bowl. Repeat with another bag of frozen fruit. This is really much easier than pitting the fresh fruit, and the fruit is just fine for all manner of uses.

### What's Happening: April-May, 1993

The key to growing healthy plants is having healthy soil. It's a good idea to build up your own soil while recycling yard waste via composting Good soil is fluffy, rich in available nutrients, and holds water well. The compost recipe is fairly simple: Mix dried plant matter with fresh green plant material and keep moist. Turn weekly to introduce oxygen and soon you will have a source of super soil. Fermenting compost gets very hot and steams as you turn it. In a couple of months you will end up with rich, dark soil that can be used to side-dress vegetables or fruiting plants. Mix some peatmoss in and you will have made a great potting soil for starting your rooted cuttings and seedlings.

Normally cast-off items suitable for composting include grass clippings, fallen leaves, weeds, egg shells, manures, prunings, kitchen vegetable peelings, coffee grounds, and hair from the barber shop, among other things. The intense heat generated by an active compost pile pasteurizes the ingredients. This means that weed seed, fungi, and other plant disease organisms are killed, so you don't have to worry about spreading them around later. Finished compost can be spread all over your yard to improve the underlying soil. You just can't have too much!
