PROGRAM: The USF FALL PLANT FESTIVAL is scheduled for October 12 & 13. Consequently, we will forego our usual monthly meeting, which would be on the 2nd Sunday of the month, Oct 13, to participate in the USF Plant Festival. All members are invited to participate & bring plants to donate or sell. Parking is free but admission is \$3.00, for which the club will reimburse workers & participants in the Sale. This is an interesting affair & well worth the admission. Likewise, it is a social event as well as a money maker for the club. We will have no tasting table or plant raffle this month. But we desperately need workers. Let's make the USF Sale our big one. Please join us!

USF FALL PLANT FESTIVAL

The RFCI will participate in the USF Plant Festival on Oct 12 & 13, 2002. This is an important fund raiser and all members are invited to attend, to assist in the Sale, to sell plants, to enjoy the camaraderie and to visit other groups.

Our participation will begin around 1:00 Friday afternoon, Oct 11, raising tents, setting up tables, arranging plants & posters, til about 6:00 pm.

On Saturday, Oct 12, the Gardens will be open from 7:00 am to 9:00 am for our final preparations. Price for admission is \$3.00, reimbursed by the Club.

The front gate will close at 8:30 am Saturday & Sunday, & participants will have to enter by the side south gate after the front gate closes, on foot, until 9:00.

From 7:00 am to 9:00 am on Saturday & Sunday, traffic will be one way, in the front gate & out the side gate. The Festival wil end at 4:00 pm on Saturday & 3:00 pm on Sunday, and only after 4:15 & 3:15 pm respectively, will we be allowed to bring vehicles in to re-supply or remove plants.

Parking for participants not bringing plants or supplies is across the street from the front entrance to the Gardens.

The USF Botanical Gardens takes 10% or our gross sales; the remaining 90% will be split 70/20 between the participant & the RFCI, so mark your plants accordingly, remembering that you get 70% of the selling price, less taxes.

We have provided ID cards for RFCI workers. Only those with ID cards will be allowed in before the Sale begins. If you are refused admittance, someone from our group will vouch for you to gain admittance. If you need an ID card, call Bob Heath at 813-289-1068 evenings or 879-6349 during the day.

Our crop of sugar apples is about done for the season. We had green ones, red ones and the purple-red 'Kampong Mauve'. No Ilamas nor custard apples set at all despite plenty of flowers. Carambolas are having a great year - every tree has flowers, fruit or both. We made a batch of jelly from a bag full of these star fruit given to us by a friend who has a huge, ever-bearing tree near Westshore Blvd. We also got a nice, big crop of Downy Rosemyrtle fruit and made jelly from them. The flavor is good and the deep purple color is very attractive.

All bananas are growing very well thanks to heat, rain, sun and <u>lots</u> of horse manure.

I thought my nice purple, seedless grape had succumbed to Pierce's disease so I clipped the whole vine off near the ground 2 months ago. It has since grown back all the way to the top wire and looks well.

Watermelons are coming in - one at 22 pounds.

'White' pomegranate is ripening its 30 fruit. Inside they are a light pink and sweet.

New plantings: Pineapples, soybeans, string beans, onions, Chinese vegetables.


OR:

Go north on 49th St N. to 46th Ave N. Turn right on 46th Ave. Go to 37th St N. Turn left. Go about 1 block on right.






WEST PALM BEACH Bus Trip: 2nd Pickup Location: BRANDON TOWN CENTER MALL

Parking lot near road between Burdines & Sears. DIRECTIONS: from Tampa: East on I-4 to I-75 South. Take Exit 51 to Hwy 60/Brandon Blvd. East on Brandon Blvd. Turn right onto Brandon Town Center Drive (big mall sign - just past Barnes & Noble). Turn right or left at first stop sign. A GUIDE TO TROPICAL FRUIT TREES & VINES by Nick Acrivos (continued)

62. Nephelium lappaceum - Rambutan

61. Manthot esculenta - Cassava, Tapioca, Yuca An herbaceous shrub to 9 feet, native to South America. The plant has milky sap and the deeply cut leaves have 3-7 lobes. Flowers are not noticeable. Angled fruit is about 1/2 inch in diameter. Plants are grown for their roots. There are two varieties, a sweet one whose roots can be eaten raw; and a bitter one whose roots are poisonous. Roots of the bitter variety must be ground, the juice extracted and then boiled or roasted. The flavor if both is good when cooked. Latin people use roots with oil and garlic. Tapioca, used in puddings, is the starch removed from the roots. Roots are also used as potatoes and as a flour-like thickener. Plants are started from 4-6 inch cuttings.

Large tree native to Malaya and cultivated in the tropical lowlands of Central America and the Philippines. Fruit is a drupe, bright red when mature; sometimes the color is orange and the skin is covered with soft, fleshy spines. The fruit, about 2 inches long, is produced in terminal clusters of 10 to 12. The flesh is white adhering to a flattened seed. Flavor varies from sweet to sub-acid. Plants are propagated by air layering or grafting.
