

FREE FRUIT TREES

On Thursday, Nov. 17, a realtor named Catherine called, trying to locate someone to move some fruit trees. It seems a Vietnamese family in St Petersburg had sold their house and the buyers wanted to destroy some fruiting trees in the back yard, to make room for an addition. She gave me the location of the house, which was in Paul Branesky's neighborhood. I told her we would get back to her very soon and immediately called Paul at home. He said he would call her and make arrangements to look at the trees. When he called me back, he indicated that there were 4 trees which appeared to be movable: a mango, a lychee, a longan & a sugar apple. Paul and Catherine set up a date for moving them and Paul will let us know how things go. If he can get 4 nice fruiting trees for only the effort of moving them, why not!



WHAT'S HAPPENING

Ripe citrus fruits are beginning to happen. Early fall brings on Key limes. These yellow-green orbs, packed with delicious lime flavor, are so juicy and useful, whether added to a salsa for dipping, or as an accent to a pumpkin soup or broiled fish. The first tangelo to ripen is "Early Sunshine", which is perhaps the most attractive citrus fruit; medium sized, usually unblemished and blessed with a beautiful yellow color. The Early Sunshine juice is somewhat grapefruit-like in flavor so it's quality is not quite as desirable as other tangelos which ripen later. Still, we cherish its flavor and welcome its arrival.

Our Sesban specimen plant - <u>Sesbania grandiflora var. Coccinea</u> - has been flowering. A gift from the Coronels, it is a very interesting plant, a legume, native to tropical India. It has currently grown to 9 feet tall. The flowers are called vegetable hummingbirds and for a very good reason: they look just like a winged, red full sized hummingbird. The attaching stem is its "bill". These unique flowers can be eaten raw in salads, fried or added to stews and soups. The flavor is reported to be similar to mushrooms. The seed pods may be eaten also, like string beans, and the young leaves and shoots are edible as well. It also makes such a pretty ornamental.

Fall temperatures are steadily dropping; we will be enclosing our carport with plastic sheeting soon and then moving our most valuable tropicals inside for the winter.

Our fall vegetable gardens are looking the best ever. The pigeon peas have finally decided to flower, and what a show! Hundreds of bright yellow blooms will soon give way to pod after pod of what I know will be delicious, nutritious peas. We can hardly wait!

New plantings: onions, thyme, carrots, peas, lettuces. Transplanting of broccolis, Chinese vegetables and broccoli raab is ongoing.
