#### Dear Members:

Another successful "Citrus Celebration" at the Florida State Fair thanks to our dedicated club members and our citrus participating suppliers. For about 20 years our Club has continued to display and sample many citrus varieties. This year some of our citrus suppliers stepped up a bit more:
