യ Mango Grafting ശ

with Walter Zill

At March's meeting, Walter Zill returned to demonstrate grafting techniques of Mangoes, something his family has been doing for generations on their family farm. (See June 2018's newsletter for part one of Walter's talk on mangoes.)

Using slides and live video of the grafts as they were being done, the audience could view the graftings as they were worked on living specimens.

Walter feels it is important for everyone to know how to propagate the best mango varieties by grafting. The scion (cutting that is grafted to the rootstock) will carry all the desired qualities of the variety of mango tree that it was cut from. Grafting is an excellent and inexpensive way to get the varieties you want.





All banana plants have been trimmed of dead leaves and the last persimmon trees have been pruned as they have begun to awaken. Grafting season has arrived – I not only did some carambolas, persimmons and pawpaws, but I was hired to give a grafting and air layering

In Zephyrhills

This past winter was wonderful for the Zephyrhills area; abundant and regular rains, no harsh winds, and especially – NO FREEZES!!!!! This is certainly news worth tooting about, as in the 13 winters since we have been at this location, we have never had a "no-freeze" winter. There were some light frosts, but no real damage to any plants. The neighborhoods are filled with abundant color, flower, and fragrance. Trees and shrubs are blooming that we've never seen blooming before. How did this remarkable winter weather affect our fruits?

Loquats are very heavy with fruit this year. Low-chill peaches and blueberries did not lose buds and forming fruits due to the late freezes we always have had. Mulberries flowered early and are now providing full crops. The olive is a full flush of tiny flowers. Bananas, another plant that always freezes easily, were able to retain growing hands of fruit. Citrus look and smell wonderful. Avocadoes are showing a very promising crop. The papaya is flowering heavily, another plant that is easily frozen and did not have any damage this winter.

There were several bell peppers, tomatoes, a Seminole squash vine, and a few bean plants that kept on producing a few fruits throughout the season. These plants are usually amongst the first to suffer cold damage, often as early as November or December. It has been a wonderful transition into a new growing season.
