Some good things are happening in this great growing weather. We are feasting on Glenn mangoes daily as we enjoy our largest crop ever. Our che tree finally bore some properly ripened fruit. Often called Chinese mulberry, *Maclura tricuspidate* fruits are sweet, chewy, and taste like figs, to which they are related.

Two smallish soursops ripened and they were tasty eaten fresh. So many grapes are ripening that I'm having to freeze some for winemaking later.

Avocadoes are starting to drop – a sign that I need to step up my harvesting. Yellow passionfruit are falling; each morning is like hunting for Easter eggs.

New plantings: five grapevines and a grafted white sapote.

Interesting survey on breadfruit that may be of interest to some readers:

Researcher looking for input from Florida gardeners regarding growing breadfruit. I'm a geographer based in South Carolina, originally from Tampa. My research involves studying how climate change is reshaping agricultural landscapes. Recently I've been looking into efforts to grow tropical plant species further and further from the tropics with a focus on breadfruit (*Artocarpus altilis*). I've created a brief online survey and would be grateful for your assistance in sharing it with anyone affiliated with the Tampa Bay chapter of the RFC who might be growing breadfruit in Florida. Happy to answer any questions or discuss this research further if you like.
