The 2023 Mango and Tropical Fruit Tasting George Campani

The Annual Mango and Fruit Tasting Event on Sunday, June 11, 2023 was an overwhelming success. However, planning the event began with a hiccup! Once again, the Mango Gathering Committee was reminded of the ups and downs of the agricultural industry as our suppliers on Pine Island were hit hard by Hurricane Ian on September 28, 2022 and are still in the process of recovering. This made the challenge of getting many varieties of mangos more

difficult and more far-reaching than in years past. The Mango Gathering Committee was split in two groups. One group (Alice Stein, Hillary Cosenza, Dylan Chadwell, Carmen Goodwin) went to the Southeast Coast of Florida looking for new mango suppliers, and the other group (Paul Branesky and George Campani) went to Pine Island.

The trip to Pine Island was eye-opening: Once on Pine Island we observed that most of the mango trees had no mangos on them. (note in these pictures that all trees have to regrow their canopies, one large tree is propped up, and there are baby trees planted to fill in empty spots.) Our only success on Pine Island was at "Gatherings Grove" run by John Brosseau. Gatherings Grove was hit hard by Hurricane Ian, but they had a few mangos at the back of the grove and John was able to find us a few varieties that made the trip successful: Carrie, Nam Doc Mai, Choc Anon, and Falan.

While we were in the grove, John spoke about the different varieties of mangos and mentioned that the Choc-Anon mango is "unique", because it can fruit in the summer and the winter; and sometimes it will give you two crops a year. He introduced us to the Falan Mango and mentioned that it can be eaten green. John's trees will take time to recover and he is



adding some new varieties of mangos. I hope this Hurricane Season will leave Pine Island alone.


Many New Members showed-up for the first time and got to meet and have conversations with long-time Club Members about growing mangos and other fruits.

Most of us are full of mangoes by now after our successful mango tasting. Our own 'Glenn' tree is providing more than enough fresh fruit for two people. The rains that seemed so promising a few weeks ago have suddenly stopped. This is supposed to be our normal rainy season. Some of our grapes have been harvested and put away in a freezer for future

winemaking. Other varieties are being attacked from all sides by mammals and birds before they can attain real ripeness. I have netted some vines and placed more traps to save what I can.

We have a single tree of a mulberry relative called by many names – che, melonberry, Chinese mulberry, etc. Said to be dioecious, it will make seeded fruit occasionally on its own. When very ripe, the fruits taste like a chewy fig.

New plantings: Savannah cherry, cherry of the Rio Grande, and a grafted grape.
