<u>September 8, 2024</u>: Josh Jamison: "All about bananas" This presentation will cover the world's most important fruit – the banana! We will take a broad look at the world of bananas and



how this tropical fruit can be grown successfully in Florida gardens. Topics discussed will include history, basic growing strategies, soil preparation, variety selection, and more. Special attention will be paid to discussion of genetics and cultivar selection, a critical part of Florida banana cultivation. Josh is the primary grower at Cody Cove Farm and Nursery in Babson Park, Florida, a small family farm specializing in unique edible crop genetics. Their goal is to provide nutritious food to

the community and promote sustainable agriculture through offering high quality plants and produce. They have a special focus on collecting elite edible plant varieties from around the world and making them available to home gardeners, small farms and beyond.

Food Forestry - Creating and Eden with Perennial Plants With Amanda Pike, PhD

At August's meeting Club members enjoyed food forest expert Amanda Pike discuss how to use food forestry principles in one's yard space. She had copies of her book "Transforming Florida Yards" available for purchase. This book describes the plants suitable for north, central, and south Florida gardening zones, and included steps in how to create a flourishing garden.

Amanda has taken her farming experience, and created an amazingly diverse landscape of over 200 species of edible plants, and also has chickens, and 26 bee hives on her 2 acres in Jupiter. Amanda and her family can get 70% of their meals from their food forest!

Take-aways from Amanda's talk:

- *Permaculture works with nature rather than against it, using affordable, sustainable ways to grow.
- *The goal of a food forest is to put food on the table. Other goals are to replace some of our purchased groceries, and to provide food insurance.
- *Unfortunately, most people live in a food desert of sorts, not having direct access to fresh produce. Also unfortunately, most people live in a food swamp, where access to processed, packaged, fast foods is prevalent.
- *There are 3 annual grasses that fill about 60% of the human diet, wheat, corn, and rice. Wheat is most common in the United States. Corn is more common in Latin countries, and rice in Asian countries.
- *Food forests have 7-9 layers: Canopy/Trees, Large Shrubs, Shrubs, Herbaceous, Groundcover/creepers, Underground, Vertical/climbers, Aquatic/Wetland, Mycelial/Fungal layer.
- * A tremendous amount of food can be grown on a tiny city lot, don't let a small yard stop you! *Food forests are also lots of fun and educational for children of all ages. Get them involved!

Member Spotlight - KC Gonzalez

KC is the Club's secretary, and she is also an avid food forest gardener. Her Tampa city lot garden shows what amazing accomplishments can be had in a small space.

My personal food forest garden, nestled in a suburban Tampa neighborhood (10A), began 10 years ago as a



tropical ornamental garden. Over the last three years, it has evolved into a lush, high-density food forest. Spanning 0.17 acres, it features around 100 fruit trees, an array of fruiting shrubs, vines, and bushes, medicinal plants, and raised beds for annuals. While maintaining some of the original rare tropical ornamentals, the garden now thrives as a vibrant ecosystem focused on sustainable, home-grown food. Tropical storm Debbie dumped a little over ten inches of rain here. Not only was that welcome to end the drought, but it didn't harm much. The bananas are loving the heat, rain, and humidity.

I made a bunch of air layers on the Guthrie plums. A sprout is showing from a planted seed of the mammee apple we tasted at our mango festival in June.

The different sugar apple fruits are growing, as are the other Annonas. A small percentage turn black and fall off. I think it's a fungus causing that. There

are four cherimoyas still hanging, only two Ilamas and just one African custard apple – the others just disappeared. The pindo palm is back to making a heavy rack of delicious fruit every month.

Tomato, pepper and passionfruit seeds have been planted and are sprouting.

Dragonfruit mixed with pineapple makes a good dessert.
