Grafting and Hybridizing Dragonfruit

Speaker Ko Chang



There were a lot of dragonfruit lovers at July's meeting, where Ko Chang returned to the podium, this time to discuss methods of grafting and hybridizing dragonfruit. He brought lots of plants with him to sell, and members were crowding the table to get the varieties they wanted for their gardens.

There are many benefits to being able to graft dragonfruit. Grafting gives you the ability to have many varieties in a smaller space, especially rare and unusual ones. Ko discussed the many methods of grafting with excellent slide photographs to demonstrate techniques.

Ko then talked about hybridizing, where a cross is between 2 varieties. The challenge is waiting for the seedlings to grow and fruit and then selecting only the very best ones! It takes 3-5 years from seed to get those first fruits.

Ample time was allowed for the many questions from the audience. Some key points: There are early, mid-season, and late varieties to keep the fruit coming throughout the warm season. There are even varieties that have multiple fruiting spurts throughout the season. Buy your plants from reliable, disease-free sources.

Use a shorter trellis to get plants fruiting earlier.

Dragonfruit plants can take about 2 days/nights of 30 degrees before suffering a lot of damage. Protect from winter winds and cold, but if you cover them, don't let them get baked in the sun under the cover.

Roots are shallow, less than 12". One or two plants in a 15 Gallon pot is good.

Fruit does not ripen once picked, so let it ripen on the stem for the very best and sweetest flavor.

The summer heat and rains are here and everything is growing at a rapid pace. The daily morning pollination of the Annonas has given way to lots of enlarging fruits — colorful sugar apples, cherimoyas, and only one Ilama. No soncoya flowers again this year.

Many pounds of grapes were harvested, cleaned, and frozen for future wine making. I am installing more grape trellises to hold a slew of newly rooted vines obtained from the germplasm repository collection in Davis, California.

Our white sapote gave us some very large fruit. I guess it was a pollination issue that kept them small in the past, leading me to believe it was a seedling tree rather than a named variety: 'Bonita Springs'. It is a delicious fruit similar in color, texture and taste to flan.

Ripe Java plums are raining down. I got one perfectly ripened Monstera deliciousa, and a few tasty 'Frederick' passionfruit dropped. Avocados have begun to be ready just as the mangoes finish for the year. Good eats!


This early announcement is for those Club Members interested in selling plants and those Members looking to purchase plants.
