

## Fred Engelbrecht



It is with saddened heart that we announce the passing of long-time member Fred Englebrecht. Fred joined the Club in 2002, has been President many times, served on the Board, and been the source of great advice and inspiration when it came to growing fruits. He will be greatly missed. He was known for his thoughtful, patient, and kind approach to leadership.

Frederic Herman Engelbrecht, 91, passed away peacefully on Tuesday September 2, 2025 in his home in Tarpon Springs, Florida.

Fred was an adventurous world-traveler, successful automotive executive, avid motorcycle enthusiast and uber-zealous fruit afficionado. Born in Holland, Fred spent his younger years in Aruba and in New York, NY where he met the love of his life and his wife, Kinuyo. Together they traveled the world as he worked for General Motors for an incredible 40-plus years. While living in Singapore, Ivory Coast, England, Japan, he visited many countries and collected masks and traditional pieces. And, in each and every country, he maintained his penchant for riding motorcycles, culminating in a trip to Sturgis, South Dakota on his Honda Goldwing. Last but not least, in his 60s, he developed a deep passion for growing fruit and his garden today boasts more than 200 varieties.

Speaker Jan Doolin of Lakeland discussed the best varieties for Florida's tough weather, and how to grow them successfully. She grows 200 trees on her one acre farm, and has raised countless varieties, assessing their performance here in Florida.

Mulberries are easy to grow, tolerant of difficult conditions and need little fussing. The fruit can be used in so many ways, and is sweet and delicious. One tree can provide enough fruit for fresh eating, and putting away in the freezer to extend the season. Fruit is not usually seen in grocery stores as it is very perishable. The mulberry is one of those trees that is a must have in your yard. The wildlife will benefit as well!


Cooler weather is on the way. This means vegetable gardens can be planted with most anything. I have planted corn, pole beans, oriental veggies, arugula, tomatoes, and peppers. Cooler weather also means you can tackle the heavier jobs without succumbing to the heat and dehydration. I finished installing nine posts for a new grape area.

Our large, potted soursop is looking good. It recently made five flowers and, after hand-pollinating, one fruit seems to have set.

The pecan tree was holding a moderate crop until the squirrels noticed. They knock off so many and eat them while still green. I am controlling the evil rodents as best I can.

We went to Pennsylvania for my father's one hundredth birthday celebration where everyone got to taste my wine. My brother, Dan, is trying to grow a few grapes despite it being too shady. Nevertheless, some were ripe and they tasted like Welch's White Grape Juice. This led me to believe they are the 'Niagra' cultivar which is what Welch's uses.

A few days after we returned, my daily inspection revealed that the lone Ilama fruit had split, indicating it was ready to pick. After a few days inside, this Annona was ready to eat. It was quite good.

## More important information regarding the October Plant Sale

If you are selling plants, you must **be present** at the Sale as long as you have plants there for sale. **No Citrus** plants. All plants must be **edible**. **No** invasive, weedy, or prohibited plants.

All plants must be healthy, no disease or insects,

Plants must be properly identified and labeled. Cultural information is helpful to buyers.

If you have your own table, chairs, or canopy, please bring them.

All set up must be done on Friday, anytime between 9am - 3pm, you may drive your vehicle into the Gardens to unload, set up and leave. **No set-up** on Saturday or Sunday allowed.

When **pricing your plants**, remember the Club gets 10%, and USF gets 20%, so price accordingly.

Please **signup** ahead of time, as this will help us make sure all duties and time slots are filled.

Plus, your name will then be on the list of who gets into the Gardens **Free** as a volunteer over the course of the weekend without having to pay the \$10 admission fee.

You must bring a completed **Plant Manifest** for Susan, or you will not be able to sell.
